GROWTH MINDSET

We are continuing to help children learn to persevere through the struggles that can come with learning. Sometimes it can be hard but the struggle helps build their confidence and character. We use a Growth Mind Set language which sounds like this when they want to give up. "Keep trying, you can't do it yet... but you are learning and will soon be able to do it." This type of language helps children to realize they are learning and aren't expected to know how to do everything, the first try. When it's a challenge and they persevere, they are sure proud of themselves when they learn how to do something.

BATTERIES

Our school will be joining Zinc Saves Lives. This is an opportunity for you to donate your old batteries to school. We will have bins set up in January and each week a volunteer will come and collect the old batteries. The batteries are to ascience lab in Vancouver where they extract the zinc from the batteries. The zinc is put into pills, and once the pills are done being made I send them to a doctor over in Ethiopia. The doctor gives them to the sick children. These children have a malnutrition disease called Diarrheal Disease. The family's of the sick children are given these pills to make them feel better.

Our students will be dismissed at 12:00 on Thurs. February 7th so that teachers can hold Parent/Student/Teacher Conferences. This is a great time to come in and find out how your child is progressing. TEACHING VOCABULARY

Christmas is a rich time of year to teach new words. Don't forget about the action words and describing words too! Vocabulary is best taught when your child is interested and engaged. Spend time not only reading a book's story, but also talking about the pictures. Label new items and actions as your child is participating in an activity (i.e. when you are decorating a tree, baking, window shopping etc.). If your child doesn't know a word... just tell them!

Nouns: ornament, wreath, footprint, sprinkles, icicle

Describing words: slippery, shiny, cozy, sweet, frozen

Verbs (action words): decorate, wrap, stir, shovel, invite

ORDERING DETAILS:

- Online ordering will be open at least by the 1st of each month until 1 week before date of hot lunch
- Orders are paid for using credit card online through munch a lunch secure system. Or brought to school by ordering date deadline. If payment is not received by deadline you will be notified of your order cancellation.

Please note if your child is ill on a lunch date, you are welcome to come and pick up their lunch at 12 pm from the downstairs kitchen; otherwise please consider it a donation for a child who does not have a lunch. Consistent with previous years, there are NO REFUNDS as this is a PAC fundraiser. INCLEMENT WEATHER SCHOOL CLOSURE GUIDELINES

Information for Parents and Students



Inclement weather conditions such as freezing rain, significant snowfall or high wind can occur during the fall and winter months. In such conditions, decisions on the opening or closure of school district facilities are made by the Superintendent of Schools in consultation with management and supervisory staff who have checked first-hand on the driving conditions and general condition of buildings.

While service to students and parents is a priority and schools will be kept open as much as is reasonably possible, student and staff safety is the primary consideration.

In the event of extreme weather conditions, parents are urged to check the School District website www.sd33.bc.ca or tune into radio stations STAR FM (98.3 FM) or THE DRIVE (89.5 FM), to receive up-to-date information on school closures and information on the buses. Reports will start after 6:00 a.m. and will be repeated often. The information broadcast is directly from the School District. The reports are confirmed and there is no need to call your school, the School District Office or the radio station. Students will be marked absent for the day, but such an absence will not affect a perfect attendance record.

In the event that there is inclement weather but the school remains open, it is the parent's decision, based on their assessment of the relative safety of travel conditions, as to whether or not their children attend school.

A **Transportation Snow Plan** is in place for students who rely on travel by school bus and live in higher elevations such as Chilliwack Mountain, Majuba Hill, Ryder Lake and some areas of Columbia Valley and the Eastern Hillsides. An announcement will be made should travel in these areas become challenging due to slippery road conditions. (*Please note: the greater Promontory area does not have a snow plan*).
